1. Are you satisfied with how the state legislature has addressed developing and balancing the state budget? Please explain.

The Republican legislature submitted a balanced budget with no tax increases and no money taken from the rainy-day fund. The budget was submitted before the end of the 60-day session, eliminating a requirement for an extended session to approve the budget. This has not happened in approximately thirty years, and saved the taxpayers tens of thousands of dollars.

2. What new or additional measures are necessary to create a safe and healthy environment for all West Virginians?

West Virginia has come a long way in the last four years of Republican leadership in the areas of lawsuit reform, regulation reform, and job increases. Year-to-year job increases since 2017 have seen an increase of 3,500 jobs in construction, manufacturing, mining and logging, etc. The gas industry is also looking very promising, along with the severance taxes therefrom.

3. What do you think the role of the legislature should be in developing a more diversified economy in the state?

The legislature needs to have a laser-focus on ridding the state of taxes like the onerous business and industry tax that is antiquated and punitive. Perhaps no other state tax is as counter-productive as this one. We need to continue with tort reforms and regulation reform also. 1. Are you satisfied with how the state legislature has addressed developing and balancing the state budget? Please explain.

I am not satisfied with how the legislature has handled the budget largely due to their misplaced priorities. They have prioritized corporate give-a-ways and tearing down unions instead of taking care of our people.

2. What new or additional measures are necessary to create a safe and healthy environment for all West Virginians?

Legislators need to hold industries financially accountable via honest assessments of the damage they do to our roads, air, water, and land. This begins with strictly enforcing the current rules; for example, making sure well heads are properly closed. Corporations cannot get out of their commitments to clean up worksites via bankruptcy and loopholes. We need stronger penalties for non-compliance.

3. What do you think the role of the legislature should be in developing a more diversified economy in the state?

The legislature should work to incentivize technological developments, job training and school programs, and new businesses. This includes, but is not limited to, expanding alternative energy production, funding state-wide high-speed internet, decreasing the cost of post high school education (from apprenticeships to colleges), supporting the hemp and medicinal marijuana industries, and bringing jobs from Washington to District 3.

1. Are you satisfied with how the state legislature has addressed developing and balancing the state budget? Please explain.

West Virginia needs environmentally-responsible energy policy and sensible cannabis legislation. In my view, we must act urgently because WV is poised for explosive growth. 2. What new or additional measures are necessary to create a safe and healthy environment for all West Virginians?

West Virginia is an energy state carrying environmental impacts from coal/industrial expansion and abandonment. Local examples include Manville,

Urgently develop: 1) Natural gas and alternative energy industry in WV to create quality businesses and jobs that use our natural resources within our borders to benefit our people; 2) Agriculture. Be an early adopter of hemp, an incredible source of food, medicine and fiber, and responsibly grow the cannabis industry to create an entirely new revenue source in WV.
